### 2023 Application for Backyard Residential Chickens / Ducks

The following standards shall be met and will be inspected by cit- permit:	y staff before issuance of a

- 1. Chickens/Ducks shall be limited to no more than six per lot. Roosters are not permitted.
- 2. Coops housing chickens/ducks shall be required and provide a minimum of four (4) square feet of space per chicken and/or duck. Construction of coops shall follow accessory building guidelines set forth in § 108-128, Keeping of Animals in Residential Zones and shall have both a roof and walls, and shall be adequately ventilated. Coops shall be maintained in a clean manner and free of vermin. Runs are permitted, but must be fully enclosed with poultry netting or a similar material. Runs shall not count towards the square footage requirement.
- 3. Coops and runs shall not be placed less than twenty-five feet from any property line and shall be in the rear yard.
- 4. The area housing the coop and run shall be fenced in to prevent chickens leaving the lot.
- 5. If a permittee is found to be in violation of this section or adopted nuisance codes and fails to address the issue in the allotted timeframe, the Department shall pursue revocation of the issued permit.
- 6. Keeping of ducks requires the installation of a 'kiddie pool' or similar water resource.
- 7. The department shall have 30 business days to issue or deny the permit. A notification of issuance or denial of the permit shall be delivered by hand delivery or by mailing such notice to the applicant's address on or before the thirtieth business day. If denied, the notice shall state the reasons for denial.

- 8. The applicant may appeal the decision of the Department to the City Council by filing a written notice of appeal with the City Clerk no later than ten days after the denial or revocation of the permit. The City Council shall hear the appeal at the next regularly scheduled meeting that is at least fourteen days after the notice of appeal has been filed. A final written decision on the appeal shall be rendered by the City Council no more than 30 days from the date the appeal was heard.
- 9. Subdivision covenants may restrict the owning of chickens/ducks. Please review your covenants carefully. The City of Harlem does not enforce covenants.
- 10. Once issued, permits do not need to be renewed.

# **HEALTHY FAMILIES AND FLOCKS**

Live poultry, such as chickens, ducks, geese, and turkeys, often carry harmful germs such as *Salmonella*. While it usually doesn't make the birds sick, *Salmonella* can cause serious illness when it is passed to people.

#### HANDWASHING PROTECTS YOU FROM GERMS



- Always wash your hands with soap and water right after touching live poultry or anything in the area where they live and roam.
- Adults should supervise handwashing for young children.
- Use hand sanitizer if soap and water are not readily available.

#### HANDLE BIRDS SAFELY



- Children younger than 5 years, adults older than 65 years, and people with weakened immune systems should not handle or touch chicks, ducklings, or other live poultry.
- Do not bring chicks, ducklings and other live poultry to schools, childcare centers, or nursing homes.
- Do not snuggle or kiss the birds, touch your mouth, or eat or drink around live poultry.

#### SAFELY CLEAN COOPS

- Clean any equipment used to care for live poultry outside, such as cages or feed or water containers.
- Set aside a pair of shoes to wear while taking care of poultry and keep those shoes outside of the house.



#### POULTRY BELONG OUTSIDE

- Do not let live poultry inside the house, especially in kitchens.
- Do not let live poultry in areas where food or drink is prepared, served, or stored.
